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Jesus Celebrated Hanukkah


The major dilemma for many Jewish people, including Messianic Jews is what to do about Christmas? Most traditional Jews don't celebrate Christmas because they don't believe in Jesus as their Messiah. Some Jewish folks go along with their non-Jewish friends to Christmas dinners and other celebrations, but they're just being social. Jewish Christians who've assimilated into denominational or non-denominational churches often celebrate Christmas, however, most Messianic Jews do not celebrate December 25th as Jesus' birthday. In fact Messianic Jews have no official holiday to celebrate the Savior's birth. At first that might seem strange to some of you. You might ask, if Messianic Jews believe that Yeshua (Jesus) is the Savior of the world, then why don't they celebrate Christmas? Stay with me and I'll try to answer that one.


Most Messianic Jews celebrate Hanukkah because Jesus celebrated Hanukkah: In John 10:22, we read: "At that time the Feast of the Dedication took place at Jerusalem: It was winter, and Jesus was walking in the temple in the portico of Solomon." The Feast of Dedication is Hanukkah. Jesus lived in Galilee, and He would have had to walk about eighty miles in the cold of winter to get to Jeru-

salem for this feast. Why didn't He just celebrate Hanukkah in his home in Galilee? I believe he made the difficult journey to Jerusalem for Hanukkah to make a point to you and me. The point is that Hanukkah is God's appointed holiday for this season. Hanukkah is not just a cultural celebration for the Jewish people.. It is important to God. If Yeshua had wanted us to celebrate Christmas, why didn't He teach His disciples to do that? Matthew 28:19 says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations (Gentiles), baptizing them in the name of the Father, and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you..." He clearly taught them to observe Passover (see MT 26, Mk 14, Lk 22, and Jn 2:23, etc...). The Last Supper was a Passover Seder meal. It was concerning Passover that Yeshua said, "Do this in remem-

brance of Me." Yeshua was very direct and specific in His instruction to keep the Passover, and the Apostle Paul confirmed those instructions in 1Corinthians 5:7-8 when he said, "For Christ our Passover also has been sacrificed. Therefore let us celebrate the feast." In John 7, Yeshua celebrated Sukkot (The Feast of Tabernacles). Jesus kept the Biblical/Jewish Sabbath: In Luke 4:16 it says "As was His custom, He entered the synagogue on the Sabbath and stood up to read." The Jewish/Biblical Sabbath starts Friday night at sundown and goes all day on Saturday, so we know that keeping the Shabbat (Sabbath) was His custom. These quotes are right from the Bible, and these are the things Yeshua taught and commanded His disciples to observe and to teach the Goyim (Nations, Gentiles).

So where do we get holidays like Christmas and Easter?





Yes, Yeshua was born in a manger in the little town of Bethlehem to a Jewish mother and father. He is both the Son of God and the Son of man. But all through His earthly

life there is no evidence of birthday or Christmas celebrations mentioned beyond the Scriptural account of His birth. The fact is that, the first Christmas celebration in Bethlehem was imported by Helena, the mother of the Roman Emperor Constantine, who visited Israel in the fourth century and built the Church of the Nativity along with many other Churches. That's some three hundred years after the resurrection of the Messiah that Christmas finally arrived in the Holy Land! If God wanted it to be celebrated, why doesn't the New Testament teach us to, and why did it take 300 years to be imported to Israel?

Did you know that the Puritans didn't celebrate Christmas? In fact in 1659 a law was passed in Massachusetts forbidding the observance of Christmas. The first state to officially celebrate Christmas was Alabama in 1836, and then Louisiana in 1838. It wasn't until the middle of the 19th century that Americans embraced Christmas. (1) Why did it take two hundred years from the founding of Boston and some 229 years from the time the settlers arrived at Jamestown for Christmas to be officially celebrated, and then by only two states?

Thomas Jefferson may not have celebrated Christmas. In fact when I visited Monticello (Jefferson's home) during the Christmas season, the guide told us how he kept perfect and meticulous records of everything, including the books in his library. That's how they were able to restore his home. When I asked the guide about the lovely Christmas decorations that were on display, he told me there was no record of Mr. Jefferson decorating for the holiday... they just guessed what type

of decorations he might have used and made it up. Jefferson kept records about everything else so why not Christmas? It is even public record that at times Congress was in session on Christmas day.


What about December 25th?

Very few people believe in Santa Clause, elves and flying reindeer, but did you know that Jesus wasn't born on December 25th? Some people who do know it choose to ignore that inconvenient little fact because: **1.**Tradition **2.**Tradition **3.**Christmas is fun **4.**Oh those lights are so festive and pretty 5. Everybody else is doing it and you don't want to be left out. But if Jesus wasn't born on December 25th then who was? And how did it come to be considered Jesus' birthday? The answer is the pagans believed that the sun deity was born on December 25th long before the birth of Jesus. According to C.J. Koster, "The fact of the pagan origin of the festival of Christmas on the 25th December, namely, as birthday of the Sun-deity, is admitted by all scholars.

The Messiah could not have been born in mid-winter on the 25th December. According to Luke, the shepherds were out in the fields, "watching over their flock by night" (Luke 2:8). In Israel no one would permit their flock out on a winter night." (2) The Catholic Encyclopedia says, "Christmas was not among the earliest festivals of the Church. Irenaeus and Tertullian omit it from their lists of feasts. What is the origin of this Christmas on 25 December? Sir James Frazer says. The largest pagan religious cult which fostered the celebration of December 25 as a holiday... was the pagan sun-worship, Mithraism... This winter festival was called... the Nativity of the SUN."(3). "The Mithraists also observed SUN-DAY and kept sacred the 25th of December as the birthday of the Sun." (4) In the Roman empire of the fourth century, there were many sun worshiping cults competing with Christianity. The Roman Emperor Constantine mixed the Biblical teachings of God with the practices of the sun worshiping pagans. This mixing of Truth and paganism is called "Syncretism."

"Practically all the known Sun-deities were born on the 25th December. In S.E. Titcomb, Aryan Sun-Myths, the origin of Religions, we find it cited... that the following sun deities

were all born on 25 December, according to their legends: Krishna (Vishnu), Mithra (Mithras), Osiris, Horus, Hercules, Dionysus (Bacchus), Tammuz, Indra, Buddha. Therein we also read of the Scandinavian goddess Frigga in whose honor a "Mother-night" festival was held at the winter solstice (December 25), as well as a similar great feast of Yule, where a boar was offered at the winter solstice in honor of Frey. Thus we find the three great days of Christianity, namely Sun-day, Easter and Christmas, all

Mark 7:7-8 says, "But in vain do they worship Me, teaching as doctrines the precepts of men. Neglecting the commandment of God, you hold to the tradition of men." Dt 12:2-3, "You shall utterly destroy all the places where the nations whom you shall dispossess serve their gods, on the high mountains and on the hills and under every green tree... you shall obliterate their name from that place. Dt 4:2, "You shall not add to the word which I am commanding you, nor take away from it, that you may keep the commandments of the Lord your God which I command you." DT 12:30, "Beware that you... do not inquire after their gods, saying, how do these nations serve their gods that I also may do likewise? V. 32 says, "What I command you, you shall be careful to do; you shall not add to nor take away from it."
